Biblical Foundation of the Course

Jesus embraced little children and told us to do the same. We are told to train them because as faithful adults the Scriptures learned from infancy will be remembered (Mark 10:13-16; Prov. 22:6; 2Tim. 3:14, 15). God's chosen prophetess told us, "Too much importance cannot be placed on the early training of children. The lessons that the child learns during the first seven years of life have more to do with forming his character than all that it learns in future years." (CG 193) Early instruction, guidance and modeling of relationships made with God for young Joseph, Samuel, David, Esther, Daniel and his three friends made these Biblical children leaders in God's nation. We have a responsibility to God and to the very youngest child, "If we will live in communion with God, we too may expect the divine Spirit to mold our little ones, even from their earliest moments" (DA 512). By nurturing the growth and development of young children's relationship with Jesus that He will be honored even more than John expressed in a letter to a friend: "I could have no greater joy than to hear that my children are following the truth." (3 John 1:4) and drawing the children unto salvation in Him, this is the Biblical foundation of this course.

Biblical Foundation Course Objectives

- 1. To understand that spiritual development begins where the physical and emotional development of newborns begins, and how this is so.
- 2. To learn how to cultivate young children's relationship with God via trust, friendships, love, praise, prayer, nature, respect, good values and healthy sensibility.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successfully completing this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Describe when and how spiritual development begins.
- 2. Summarize theory and research of renowned contemporary developmentalists regarding young children's (birth-7) growth in cognitive, social, emotional, and communication aptitudes.
- 3. Differentiate between and nurture both spiritual development and moral development.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge and proactive instruction to a variety of learning styles.
- 5. Create developmentally appropriate object lessons for birth through second grade children.
- 6. Tie spiritual and moral development lessons into school and childcare center Bible/Worship curriculums.
- 7. Show how specific actions and activities encourage and promote spiritual development in each of the developmental stages of birth through seven years of age.

Class Attendance, Presence, Absences and Make-Up Work

Regular class attendance is expected. In an online class, attendance looks different than it does in a face-to-face course. Each Monday during Weeks 2-7, from 5:00-6:00 p.m. Eastern Time, there will be a class meeting for EDUC 485T-B where we will pray together, discuss the week's content, have Q & A, etc. Attendance is required. If for some unforeseeable reason you cannot attend, we will generate a link to the session recording and place it in eClass in the week in which the meeting took place. You may then receive credit for attending the week's session by clicking on the provided link, listening and responding to it accordingly.
